The progress of the existing students is conveyed to the guardian time to time. All faculty members collect information and enter these in a register. IQAC inspects these reports at some interval. The issue is raised in stakeholder meets too and the alumni are asked to keep the college up to date about their activities.

The college library is fully computerized. All books are entered in the library software and issue and return of books are done by computer. the circulation process is being done by barcode system.. The library is enriched with large number of rare and reference books. College library is well connected with national library network.

ADP College is a major centre of Human Resource and Development. Students are coming from most backward and remote places of the district and its surrounding districts. Most of the students are taking admission from hill districts like Karbi Anglong and backward districts like Morigaon and Nagaon for higher education. More over lecture programmes, training programmes which are held in the college time to time are also popular amongst the students. Field trips are organized by the college for the students to aware of the major environmental issues and trained our students by our collaborating partner World Wildlife Fund (WWF).

One vacant teaching post was filled up in this academic session following all government norms. One was promoted to Associate Professor. Several teachers have been engaged on contractual basis depending on the need and work load.

Students' Feedback Analysis

Internal Quality Assurance Cell, ADP College, 2017-18

The IQAC of ADP College collected feedback from students selected at random with quota for each department in the sample. The quota-based random sample represented all departments of the college as well as both genders. However only 2nd, 4th and 6th semester students with Major in the respective subjects were included in the sample in order to make it manageable for analysis. In total 21 departments joined this survey and 315 students responded to the questionnaires. The departments were Education, Economics, Arabic, Hindi, Political Science, Commerce, Statistics, Mathematics, Sanskrit, Botany, English, Philosophy, Assamese, Herbal Science & Technology, History, Chemistry, Bengali, Geography, Zoology, Physics and Computer Science. On average there were 15 respondents from each department. In total 315 students were included in the sample. The findings of the analysis are given below.

Opinion on Major Course

In the context of depth of course content, 20 % of the students said that it was very good, 50 % said it was good, 20 % termed it satisfactory and 10 % unsatisfactory. In extent of coverage of course, 80 % of the students said that it was very good, 20 % said it was good, 0 % termed it satisfactory and 0 % unsatisfactory. In extent of applicability/relevance to real life situation, 30 % said that it was very good, 40 % said it was good, 20 % termed it satisfactory and 10 % unsatisfactory. In extent of learning value, 40 % said that it was very good, 30 % said it was good, 15 % termed it satisfactory and 15 % unsatisfactory. In extent of clarity of textual reading material, 60 % said that it was very good, 25 % said it was good, 10 % termed it satisfactory and 5 % unsatisfactory. In extent of coverage of course, 90 % said that it was very good, 10 % said it was good, 0 % termed it satisfactory and 0 % unsatisfactory. On average rating, 53.33 % said that it was very good, 29.16 % said it was good, 10.83 % termed it satisfactory and 6.66 % unsatisfactory.

Opinion on Quality of Teaching

In the context of depth of knowledge of teachers, 70 % of the students said that it was very good, 25 % said it was good, 5 % termed it satisfactory and 0 % unsatisfactory. In the context of communication skill of teachers, 60 % said that it was very good, 30 % said it was good, 5 % termed it satisfactory and 5 % unsatisfactory. In the context of interest created by teachers in the subject, 40 % said that it was very good, 30 % said it was good, 20 % termed it satisfactory and 10 %unsatisfactory. In the context of accessibility of teachers, 80 % said that it was very good, 13 % said it was good, 7 % termed it satisfactory and 0 % unsatisfactory. In the context of quality of assignments by teachers, 48 % said that it was very good, 23 % said it was good, 10 % termed it satisfactory and 19 % unsatisfactory. In the context of overall rating of teachers, 59.6 % said that it was very good, 24.2 % said it was good, 9.4 % termed it satisfactory and 6.8 % unsatisfactory.

Opinion on Encouragement by Teachers

On the question of whether teachers encouraged student participation in the class, 55 % of the students said that mostly the teachers encouraged, 28 % said it was only sometimes, 12 % termed that teachers not at all encouraged and 5 % teachers always encouraged.

Opinion on Facility of College Library

On the question of facility of college library, 83 % of the students said that it was adequate, 12 % said it was inadequate, 5 % said it was insufficient and 0 % said poor.

Opinion on Staff of College Library

On the staff of college library, 12 % of the students said that they were excellent, 83 % said they were very good, 5 % said they were average and 0 % said they were non-helpful.

Opinion on Monthly Seminars

On the question of holding monthly seminars, 98 % of the students said that it was once, 2 % said it was twice, 0 % said it was thrice and 0 % said more than thrice.

The feedback reflected high satisfaction level of the students. The facilities of the college as well as the teaching quality were highly appreciated by the students.
