Report

A lecture program was organized by the Department of Political Science in collaboration with IQAC ,ADP College, Nagaon, Assam on the topic: "Constitutional Rights of the citizens of India". Senior faculty member of Political Science, Dr. Pijush Debnath was the resource person in the program. It was attended by 80 students belonging to different streams i.e, Arts, Science and Commerce, faculty members as well as the non-teaching staff of the college. The resource person highlighted the various constitutional rights of the citizens of India after the framing of the Indian Constitution in 1950. The Indian Constitution is a social document and the core of the commitment to the social revolution lies in Fundamental Rights (Part III), and the Directive Principles of State Policy. Ever since the enactment of the U.S. Constitution it has become customary for all democratic countries to incorporate a Chapter on Fundamental Rights in their Constitution. The Constitution of India also outlines the Fundamental Rights of its citizens in Part III of the Constitution which are quite elaborating as six rights have been included. He also mentioned about the inclusion of such rights in other democratic countries of the world. These rights also have a global perspective as the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948 has increased the importance of these rights as human rights. They are also known as basic or human rights which are essential for all human beings in the world. There is also the provision of the protection of these rights through Right to Constitutional Remedies. So, Fundamental Rights are very important and are treated as fundamental as man cannot live as human being without the enjoyment of these rights and so they are also protected by the constitution. There was also an interactive session with the students as different questions were raised on the topic.
